1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution?

Feedback Obtained

Feedback from Students: The Student -teacher evaluation is done every semester. This data is analysed and Principal confers with the teacher over the report and discusses areas of possible improvement. Feedback is also obtained via mentoring sessions, where students share their problems which are communicated to head of the department by the teacher mentor. The feedback on infrastructure, canteen facility, administration related problems, curricular and extracurricular activities are taken department wise through Exit Forms every year from the final year students. This data is analysed and presented in the departmental profiles, which in turn is reported to the IQAC. The feedback regarding the library services and facilities is obtained from the final year students every year through library feedback form. It is then reviewed by the librarian and presented in the library committee meeting. The feedback is also taken from the students for the guest lecturers or speakers invited for their seminars and workshops. **Feedback from Staff:** The suggestions are given by staff members about various activities of the department in the monthly meetings. Feedback on faculty development programs and seminars organized for teaching or non-teaching staff is taken after every session through a feedback form and analysed. An inter-departmental audit is done every year. There is a self-audit by the department, then a review by another department, followed by review by IQAC coordinator, and finally by the Principal. Feedback is shared with all faculty and departments formulate their action plan to enhance their teaching learning strategies and overall functioning. **Feedback from Management Members:** Feedback from the management members is obtained during regular meetings with Management members such as the Governing Council meeting every Wednesday. Management members also share feedback during the CDC meetings and also the IQAC meetings and also offer feedback during the annual review meeting of the IQAC and CDC held in March every year. **Feedback from Employers and Industry Experts:** Feedback is obtained from industries and organizations from where the students have done their internship. This feedback helps us to assess the skills that students possess and those that require to be improved. The feedback is shared with each student in order to help the student improve their performance. This also helps to understand curricular aspects that possibly need to improve to match the industry requirements. The informal feedback is taken from the industry experts during the visit to the department either for guest lecture or seminar or 5 syllabus covered by Industry Experts. They offer invaluable feedback to students on the expectations of the marketplace. The formal feedback is obtained from the external examiners invited for the project or seminar presentations and campus placements drives. **Feedback from Alumnae and Parents:** Informal feedback is taken from Alumnae when they are invited to deliver guest lectures. Informal feedback from parents is obtained during PTA meetings and when parents are called by class teachers to discuss wards performance or on the open day. The feedback from all the stakeholders is collated and reviewed in the IQAC meetings.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Our institution conducts a mentoring program every year where students are under the guidance of teacher mentors. The institute has prepared a booklet which has the record of group mentoring and individual mentoring. The common topics suggested by the college counsellor includes coping with stress, managing academics and extracurricular activities and dealing with failure. The mentors play an important role in encouraging students to improve their academic performance, guide and support them during difficult times and situations, identify career opportunities and to ensure overall development of students. A mentors meeting is also conducted to discuss any common concerns faced by students. F.Y B.Sc. and F.Y B.CA students are divided into a batch of 25 students. Students are provided with a mentoring form which needs to be filled in by first year students and submitted to the respective mentors. The form contains all the necessary details of the student. The mentor-mentee meeting is conducted minimum four times in one academic year. The mentor counsels students on academic performance, guide and support them during difficult times and situations, identify career opportunities

difficulties faced in college or at home. F.Y and S.Y students also have class teachers with whom they can seek one-to-one interaction for personal or academic issues. From the IV semester onwards, HODs and departmental teachers act as mentors. Guidance is provided by all the staff members. The guidance is just not given during the mentoring sessions but the mentees can approach their mentors as and when required depending on the query of the students. Mentoring is also done on one to one basis. Concerns shared by students to their mentors kept confidential and recorded in logbook A full time qualified counselor on campus is available 6 days a week from 9.00 to 3.00 in a specially designated area on the 6th floor. The counselor meets the mentoring committee twice in a semester. Students with emotional or psychological concern referred to the Counsellor The counselor conducts group sessions for students based on academic concerns on the following topics: FY (1st Year) : Coping with Academic Stress, Effective ways of studying and Improving memory, Time Management, Healthy Competition SY (2nd Year) : Positive and Negative Stress and Re-examination, Dealing with Academic Failure, Working towards positive environment in class, Entrance Examination and internship guidance and How to do Referencing TY (3rd Year): Career Guidance and Soft skills, Balancing academics and extracurricular activities and Job opportunities MSc (Masters): Academic Stress and Summer internship, Placement problems, Research writing and Examination stress

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The institution follows a democratic and participatory mode of governance with all stakeholders participating actively in its administration process. The Management delegates authority to the Principal who, in turn shares it with the different levels of functionaries in the college. The Management members meet with the Principal every Wednesday to take necessary steps to formulate and implement the perspective plan of the institution. The Governing Council meets once a month wherein the Principal, Vice-Principal and coordinators get an opportunity to express their opinions and participate in decision making process. The IQAC, College Development Committee and other statutory Committees continuously work on quality improvement. The Heads of Departments, the various committee In-charges, along with the staff representatives on higher decision-making bodies play an important role in determining the institutional policies and implementing the same. The Management of the Institution encourages the teachers, students and non-teaching staff, alumni and co-ordinators to share their ideas, opinions and suggestions for further improvement. The inputs received from various committees and feedback analysis is considered for the future decision making. The Administrative and academic duties are controlled by the Principal of the Institution. Heads of the department work under the guidance of the Principal and Internal Quality Assurance Cell. Every faculty member is involved in the various academic and administrative or other statutory and non-statutory committees. All the stake holders including teaching and non-teaching staff along with student representatives together concentrate on fostering the progress of institution by sharing the responsibilities. Internal Quality Assurance Cell monitors the academic and administrative activities. An important aspect of participative management is the inclusion of representatives from students, non-teaching staff and alumina in the various bodies constituted for better functioning of the institution. Student representatives are included in the CDC, IQAC and library committee. Non-teaching staff are also members of the CDC and IQAC. Student representatives and non-teaching staffs are also part of statutory committees such as ICC, Grieve redressal cell etc. The principal conducts meetings with the student council at least twice in a semester to invite their suggestions on improving facilities. The college follows the principle of Participatory Management. ? Periodic functional review of the college, making and approving budgetary provisions, making decisions for expansion/improvement are done in the CDC meeting. ? The faculty interacts with parents in Orientation Programs, PTA meets follows up with parents of defaulters in attendance ? The students' council serves as an interface between college authority and students through regular interaction with the Principal and teachers. ? Faculty members participating in various activities like seminars, orientation and refresher courses, committee meetings etc. share their experiences/ideas to continuously bring about improvement in our functioning. ? Teaching and Learning

Academic calendar/Master timetable/examination schedule is prepared every year before the commencement of the academic year. Teaching plans are prepared at the beginning of each semester and it is periodically reviewed by HODS. Academic Mentoring is conducted by staff mentors and trained counsellor. Faculties use smart classrooms and variety of ICT tools for effective delivery of subjects. Free Wi-Fi facility available throughout the campus for staff as well as students. Teachers use various learning methodologies like flipped classroom, experiential learning, and case study to help students understand the concepts better. Faculty development programs are organised for faculty members every year.

Examination and Evaluation

Under Autonomy, the evaluation system is revised as 50 internal and 50 external for First Year students. For all the subjects new codes were allotted. To maintain confidentiality, two sets of question papers were set for the semester examination and mailed to a separate account examination@bmncollege.com. Then the principal ma'am selected the paper for the examination. Effective implementation of summative and formative evaluation is monitored by the HODs and examination committee. For summative evaluation, different techniques like unit test, viva, presentations, online exams, etc. are conducted. The college always focuses on exam reforms and follows ethical practices to prevent malpractices.

Research and Development

The Research committee conducts various workshops and seminars for teachers to promote research culture. Financial assistance is also provided to the staff for participation in national and international conferences or seminars. The Research committee coordinates with the library for availability of online databases for staff as well as students. The staff

members encourages student participation in research based competitions and undergraduate research projects and paper presentations. The committee also organises an annual intercollegiate undergraduate research competition.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure is upgraded periodically based on the recommendations of each department. The college has 17 smart classrooms . Wi-Fi facility is available throughout the campus for staff and students. Charging points are given in the classroom on the fifth floor to charge the laptops. Annual Maintenance Contract is signed for the upkeep and maintenance of Computers, Projectors, Air Conditioners and other machinery items.

Human Resource Management

Posts are advertised and faculty recruited on the basis of UGC, Government and University norms. UGC Rules and regulations are strictly adhered to during recruitment, career advancement (CAS) and superannuation for staff of the aided sections. Salary is paid on time for staff from the self-financed courses. Faculty development programs are organised to encourage professional and personal growth. Staffs are deputed to participate in short term training programs. Workshops are conducted for non-teaching staff for personal and professional up gradation.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Industry people are the members of committees like IQAC, Board of Studies, etc. They are invited as resource persons to conduct technical sessions, seminars, jury for presentations and evaluators for final year student's projects and university practical examinations. Industry visits and Study Tours are organised department wise to give industry exposure. The departments have linkages with industries for internship of students. Placement committee conducts pool campus with companies like Wipro InfoTech, Infosys, and SEED Infotech etc. In BCA, 5 syllabus is taught by industry people to give students industry perspective. MOU is also signed with Technobotics Education Centre LLP and Pepsico.

Admission of Students

The Admission Committee for the

Academic year was formed which adhered to the Admission policy which states that admission will be granted to all students irrespective of their caste, religion, socioeconomic status. For all the students and parents who come for admission, personal counselling is done by teachers. Environment Sensitization Committee, Gandhian Studies Centre and NSS Unit of our college in association with IIT Bombay had organized a mega global event - Student Solar Ambassador's Workshop 2019 as part of Gandhi Global Solar Yatra. 113 students participated in the Hands on Training Solar Lamps assembling Workshop, 75 lamp kits were assembled on 2nd October 2019 to mark the 150th birth Anniversary of Gandhiji. 1. E-Waste Collection: The College has a designated corner on the 5th floor (BCA Dept.) where a steel container has been placed for all students and staff to donate their home e-waste. During the fest an E-Waste collection competition is organized to encourage students from other participating colleges to collect E-waste.
